- (iii) When the Kingdom of Israel split into Israel and Judah following the death of Solomon, Jeroboam established two new places of worship at Dan and Bethel where he placed idols to represent God.
- (iv) The Kings who come after Jeroboam in the Northern Kingdom of Israel continued to worship idols leading people further away from the worship of Yahweh
- (v) When the Israelites were defeated in battles they thought God had forsaken them this made them seek consolation from the Canaanite gods.
- (vi) The Israelites continued using Canaanite temples for worship and this led them deeper into idolatry
- (vii) Some Kings of Israel married foreign wives and made treaties that brought stronger political alliances with neighboring state. This increased idolatry as foreign gods were also imported into Israel.
- (viii) The Israelites were attracted to the visible gods of the Canaanites as opposed to the invisible Yahweh.
- (ix) Failure of Israelites to keep the covenant they had made with God on Mount Sinai

c. Relevance of Elijah's prophetic mission to modern Christians

1b. How Transfiguration marked an important event in Jesus life

- Jesus entered into the boats belong to Simon and taught the crowd from there.
- After He had finished teaching he asked Simon to cast his nets into the lake to catch fish.
- Simon expressed reluctance because throughout the night they caught nothing, but because Jesus had told him to, he obeyed
- Simon cast the net and had a miraculous catch of fish. He had to ask for help from his partners in the other boats
- Simon was moved by the miraculous catch he fell at Jesus feet and confessed his sinfulness. His partners James and John the sons of Zebedee were also astonished at the miraculous catch.
- Jesus assured Simon not to be afraid because he now had a new role, catching men. This meant he had been called to be a disciple of Jesus
- Simon James and John pulled their boats to the shore and left everything and followed Jesus. They were the first disciples to be called by Jesus **(8 x 1) = 8 mks**

2(a) Ways in which King David promoted the worship of the True God Yahweh in Israel (8 marks)

- David brought the ark of covenant to Jerusalem
- He made Jerusalem a religious centre where all Israelites came to celebrate important religious occasions
- He composed Psalms which were used in worship by the Israelites.
- He showed respect to the prophets of Yahweh and listened to their messages
- When he made mistakes he repented and asked God for forgiveness.
- David humbled himself before Yahweh and completely submitted to his will.
- He advised others to obey God and this led to the true worship of Yahweh.
- He constantly prayed to God and sought his guidance.
- He conquered the enemies of Israel so that they would live in peace and worship God.
- He wanted to build a temple for God where the ark of covenant would be kept, and where the Israelites would meet for worship.
- He united the Israelites as one Nation and one chosen people of God, this made them to see themselves as the people of God

(b) Ways used by the Kings of Israel to bring people back to God (6 marks)

- They formed Political alliances with neighboring nations demonstrating to the people that God was to be completely trusted, example David.
- They at least sought advice from God's prophets – example David.
- They repaired the temple/made God's dwelling place presentable – example Josiah.
- They led the people in renewing their allegiance to Yahweh and the Sinai Covenant – example Josiah.
- They destroyed the altars of the gods in the Promised Land.
- They set good examples to the people by repenting their sins when warned by the Prophets – example David.

(c) What roles can modern Christians play in restoration of the true worship in Kenya (6 marks)

- They should be role models and repent their sins whenever they do wrong.
- Preach the word of God so that people may know God.

- Evangelize the word of God/spread the word of God
- Expose the works of the devil so that people know the true worship of God.
- Correct those who do wrong in a manner that would restore them to the true worship of God.

(6 points x 1 = 6 marks)

3(a) Explain the importance of Prophets in Israel

(8 marks)

- Prophets communicated God's will to the people i.e. Amos was sent to the Northern Kingdom.

- They guided and counseled people on the covenant way of life.
- They acted as the conscience of kings and society i.e. Nathan confronted King David over taking of Bethsheba and killing of Uriah.
- They foretold future events e.g. wars, coming of Messiah, judgements.
- Warned people of impending danger of judgment. Jeremiah warned people over the besiege of Jerusalem by Babylon.
- Assured people of God's salvation i.e. Exile letters by Jeremiah.
- Revealed Gods nature to the people e.g. Hosea showed that God is loving through marrying of Gover who was a harlot.
- Some acted as priests e.g. Moses, and Samuel offered sacrifices to God.
- Prophets anointed i.e. Prophet Samuel anointed King David.
- They were intercessors i.e. prayed on behalf of the people/pleaded to God on behalf of the people.
- Acted as leaders i.e. during the early times of Moses Ministry he acted as a ruler/Lawyer.
- Condemned all forms of social evils and ritual sins i.e. in times of great sin, prophets warned the people of Israel.

(Any 8 points x 1= 8 marks)

(b) Describe the call of prophet Jeremiah in Jeremiah Chapter 1 (8 marks)

- He received his call when he was a young man during the (13th of the reign of King Josiah of Judah around 627 BC
- His call was presented in form of a dialogue.
- God told him that before he was formed in the womb, the lord knew him.
- God told him that he had chosen him to be a prophet to the Nations.
- He resisted the call arguing that he did not know how to speak for he was too young.
- The Lord assured him that he will only speak what God would command him to speak.
- He was told not to be afraid for God was with him and that he will deliver him.
- Then the Lord touched Jeremiahs mouth with his hand and that he will deliver him.
- His mission was to destroy and to plant.
- During the call, Jeremiah saw two visions. Arod of Almond and a boiling pot facing away from the North.
- Then Jeremiah responded to God's call in faith and obedience.;

(1 x 8 = 8 marks)

(c) What lessons can Christians learn from the call of Prophet Jeremiah (4 mks)

- God has a purpose for each person. He knew Jeremiah before his birth and chose him for a special vocation.
- God calls anybody to do his work. He does not discriminate against persons/he chose Jeremiah as a prophet though he was young and inexperienced.
- God prepares us for his work. Jeremiah came from a priestly family. He knows about holiness of God,service and the mosaic law. God prepared him before he was born. Jer 1:5.
- A person who is called to serve God should be ready to meet opposition while serving God means speaking and standing by the truth.
- God protects his servants. Jeremiah was warned in advance about the opposition ahead. Nevertheless, God promised to be with him.
- Jeremiah initially felt inadequate to speak for God. He complained he was young and Inexperienced.We can easily identify our human weakness with Jeremiah.
- We should respond to Gods call in obedience God expects us to obey him so that he can fully use us for His purpose.

4(a) Explain Nehemiah's final reforms (Nehemiah 13) (10 marks)

- Nehemiah separated all those of foreign descent (Nehemiah 13) (10 marks)
- Cleansing the Temple by throwing out of the Temple the household furniture of Tobiah out of the Chamber (Neh. 13:4-9)
- Brought back the vessels of the house of God with the cereal offering and the frankincense/restored the Temple to its proper use.
- The Levites and the singers were returned back to their stations having fled to their farms due to neglectation by the people.

- Trustworthy people were appointed to be treasurers over the store houses, thus, Shelemiah the
- Priest, Zadock the scribe and Pedaiah of the Levites. They were to distribute to their brethren.
- Judah brought to the Temple tithe of the grain, wine and oil into the store houses.
- The Sabbath was being profaned (defiled) through buying and selling of goods on the Sabbath, Nehemiah ordered closing of doors till Sabbath, and warned those who lodged twice outside the walls of Jerusalem.
- The gates of Jerusalem were purified by the Levites.
- The Levites were to keep the Sabbath day holy
- Those who intermarried with women of Ashdod, Ammon and Moab were beaten, cursed, shaved the hair, and ordered to take oath in God's name that they will not give their sons or daughters to manage.
- Nehemiah chased Eliashib's grandson from his presence for marrying a daughter of Sanballat the Heronite (Chief of the Samaritans). This intermarriage defiled the priesthood.
- The priesthood and office was purified. (Any 5 points x 2 marks = 10 marks)

(b) Describe the dedication of the Jerusalem wall (Neh 12: 27-47) (5mks)

- Dedication was led by the Levites, who represented the priestly tradition of the Israelites. They assembled in Jerusalem.
- Singers came from all the villages of Jerusalem. They sang with instruments gotten from the temple.
- The priests and Levites purified themselves with the people also. They also purified the gates and walls of Jerusalem.
- Nehemiah led one group in procession while Ezra led another in the opposite direction. The two groups later met in the temple.
- Great rejoicing and sacrifices were made to God.
- Nehemiah appointed men who were to be responsible of the temple contributions. The priests and Levites were taken care of as required by the law.
- The Jerusalem temple was dedicated to God and the city of Jerusalem became a symbol of divine protection again. The pride of Judah was reinstated. (1 x 5) = 5 marks

(c) With reference to Nehemiah's final reforms give lessons that modern Christian leaders can learn (5 marks)

- Modern Christian leaders should advocate for the observance of the Sabbath, just like Nehemiah ensured that the Sabbath law was kept.
- Modern Christian leaders should encourage members to marry from the same denomination or people who profess the same faith.
- The church should only be used on dedicated to religious activities like prayer e.g. Nehemiah cleansed the temple which had been defiled.
- Church leaders/workers should be paid their dues to discourage them from engaging in other activities and neglecting their religious duties of Nehemiah.
- Ordered that the Levites and temple musicians be reinstated to their rightful position and be paid.
- Church leaders should enforce the law just as Nehemiah did i.e. threw out Tobiah, beating up the Israelite men who had married foreign wives.
- Modern church leaders should pray while carrying out their duties/work just like Nehemiah prayed before carrying out any reforms.
- Modern church leaders should expect opposition while carrying out their duties e.g. Nehemiah encountered opposition in his attempt to separate the Israelites men from their foreign wives.
- Modern church leaders should seek God's guidance in all their endeavours just like Nehemiah did. (1 x 5) = 5 marks

5a) Explain the factors that contribute to Social harmony in T.A.S. (8 marks)

Sharing of resources among members of the community.

- Participation in communal activities or work according to sex, age, status

- Participation of individuals in social activities which brought people together.e.g harvest, festival, commual dancees
- Involvement of all members of the community to celebrate the rites of passage.
- People of the community were governed by rules, regulations and taboos.
- Those who deviated from the norms were punished to discourage vices such as dishonesty, greed and cheating.
- Children were educated on the values, that duties, obligations, to the community.
- There was continued education for all members of the community on what was expected of them.
- Ancestral land was communally owned
- Extended family systems ensured that children/orphans and the widows were taken care of.
- Division of labour and rules governing individuals were defined and adhered to.
- Communal way of solving problems by the elders promoted understanding between people
(8 x 1 = 8 marks)

5(b) How was leisure spent in the Traditional African Community.

- **After a hard days work children played together.**
- Men gathered in one homestead to drink/discuss.
- Women gathered to make pots/mats etc.
- Youth got advice from elders in society.
- Traditional dances were performed.
- Sporting activities were carried out e.g. bull fighting.
- There were leisure visits between family members.
- They held important traditional ceremonies of wedding/initiation.
- Children were told stories/riddles, proverbs, etc.
- Both men and women had time to decorate/groom/spice themselves. **(1 x 7) = 7 marks**

(c) Challenges that face the practice of Circumcision in our society today.

- The problems associated with HIV/Aids pandemic (use of one knife in all the initiates)
- Education and the school system. The programming of the exercise in relation to the academic calendar causes disputes.
- Churches and NGOs including the government are all against female genital mutilation.
- Religious doctrines which dismiss it as of no consequences as far as life is concerned.
- It no longer promotes national identity and unity.
- Academic achievements count much more than mere circumcision.
- Some aspects involved in initiation are now unlawful e.g. killing of wild animals.
- Urban set up is not conducive to certain aspects of circumcision.
- Western culture influence that does not recognize circumcision as a rite of passage.
- Intermarriage that uproots people from their community traditions. **(5 x 1 = 5 Marks)**

6(a) Methods of teaching the Youth in Traditional African Society

- Through folk stories (tales, myths)
- Through proverbs, riddles, parables, maxims and wise sayings so as to think for themselves and to reason out.
- Through practical involvement, actual participation (e.g. the Youth accompanying, working with older people in order to learn how certain duties are done.
- Through dramatization role-playing.
- Through questions and answers in order to find out whether the children have learnt.
- Through apprenticeship in specialized areas (e.g. blacksmiths, rainmakers, herbalists).
- Assignments: when the youth are given work to do under supervision of older members of the community who correct their mistakes.
- Through peer group e.g. age groups where members learnt from one another.
- Through lectures; lectures were given by older people on such topics as their responsibilities, traditions and customs.
- Through song and dance; songs carry messages, moral lessons and through danced they learned cultural heritage and skills. **(Any 10 points x 1 mark = 10 marks)**

6(b) Qualities for one to become a leader in the African Traditional Society (5 mks)

- Courage, bravery, endurance etc.
- Age factor
- Professional background e.g. witches, sorcerer's were not accepted.
- The wealth status of the individual, industry.
- The number of wives, children was a sign of responsibility.
- The health status of the individual, physique.
- The genealogy clan.
- The popularity, charisma, level of acceptability.
- Eloquence (power of speech)
- Personal achievements (in war, hunting etc. (5 x 1 = 5 mks)

6(c) Changes on land tenure system (5 mks)

- The community land is almost extinct .

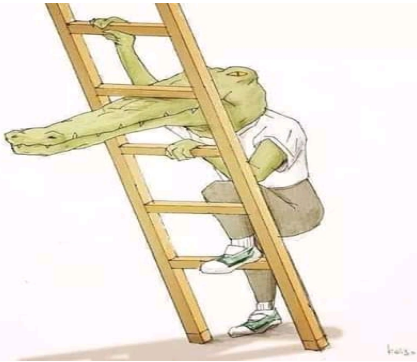

- Abraham built two altars for the Lord at Bethel and Shechem where he worshiped God.

- The festival was to be celebrated annually by all

- Entered into a covenant with them
- Provided them with Ten commandments and mosaic laws to guide them
- Healing those who were bitten by snakes
- He forgave them after breaking the Sinai covenant
- By providing their leaders e.g Moses, Aaron , priest acted as intermediaries between people and God.

b. Describe the breaking of the Sinai covenant

- the Israelites were left with Aaron when Moses went up Mt. Sinai to meet God i.e get 10 commandments
- Moses took along ; the Israelites began to suspect that he had disowned them
- they prevailed upon Aaron to make a god they could see i.e he made golden calf for them to worship.
- Aaron used jewelry they had taken out of Egypt
- They worshipped the calf, sacrificed to it, sang and danced before it. Acted immorally before it.
- They worshipped it claiming that it delivered them from Egypt
- God was greatly angered i.e sent Moses to go down i.e see what the people had done
- Moses pleaded with God not to destroy them.
- Moses went down and was so annoyed that he dropped the stone tablets on which the commandments were written.
- They had broken the covenant (blasphemed)
- Moses punished them by making them drink water mixed with the idol's ashes
- Those who did not repent were killed i.e the people from the tribe of Levi became priests.

c. state six factors that cause people to depart from God's instruction

- bad company
- Weak in faith/human weakness
- Ignorance of God's ways
- Threats from non – believers
- Greed and lust for wealth
- Greed for power
- Lack of faith/trust in God
- impatience

4. a. significance of the ark of covenant in Jerusalem

- The ark symbolized King David; obedience to God
- It was to ensure that the presence of God was felt by all the people of Israel
- It made Jerusalem the religious centre of Israel, hence God's holy city.
- It was a unifying factor to the people of Israel
- It showed that David was a servant of God while the real king was Yahweh
- The ark helped David to maintain moral behaviour in Israel.
- By bringing the ark to Jerusalem, David humbled himself before God despite being a king
- David used the ark to remain close to God for proper guidance and salvation of Israel.

b. failures of King Saul which made God to reject him as king of Israel.

- He spared King Agag of Amalekites i.e kept best sheep and cattle of Amalekites
- He disobeyed God's command e.g. between Israelites war and the Amalekites – failed
- He assumed priestly duties and offered sacrifices when Samuel delayed during the war with Philistines at Gilgal
- Spirit of the Lord left Saul and was replaced with an evil spirit that tormented him
- He was jealous of David for his success as a warrior. He plotted to kill David
- Saul committed the sin of necromancy - consulted a diviner/ medium after the death of Samuel.
- He exposed his soldiers to hunger hence they ate meat with blood – was a sin before God
- He committed suicide during the battle against the Philistines. Suicide disgraced God's rule as a giver of life

- He massacred the Gibeonites against the oath given during the time of Joshua.
c. reasons why political leaders in Kenya have failed to perform their duties effectively.

- Ridicule from the members of the society
- Inability to live up to the expectations of the electorate
- Lack of training in leadership skills leading to poor public relations
- Division and conflicts with the parties
- Lack of adequate forum to meet and address their electorate
- Insecurity, death threats and harassment from enemies
- Different ideologies resulting in divisive decisions
- Personal differences between the politicians
- Several barriers i.e differences based on culture, tribe, religion etc
- Woman leaders are discriminated against and looked down upon.

5.a. categories of prophets in the O.T

- true prophets – acted on behalf of God
- upheld new covenant
- False prophets - who claimed to speak in the name of Yahweh
- their message never came to pass
- Major prophets – their writings are elaborate, have books in their names e.g Isaiah, Jeremiah etc
- Minor prophets – whose books contain brief oracles eg Amos, Hosea, Micah, Joel etc
- Canonical prophets - contain minor i.e major prophets. their oracles are recorded under their names
- Prophetess - women prophets
- Cultic prophets - prophets who are associated with religious activities in shrines.

b. Symbolic act of Jeremiah related to judgement and punishment

Linen waist cloth - Jeremiah was asked to hide in a cleft near Euphrates. cloth got ruined and spoilt.

Jeremiah personal life – suffered loneliness same way people of Judah would suffer once God unleashed punishment.

Jeremiah's visit to the potter's house. he found a potter moulding clay into pots. The defective pots, the potter pressed some clay into a lump and moulded another pot the same way God would do so the people of Judah.

The earthen flask/broken clay flask. Jeremiah broke the clay jar publicly and announced that Yahweh would similarly destroy Jerusalem and Judah.

The vision of two baskets of figs good and bad figs - bad figs were unfit for consumption. Jeremiah warned them that God would punish them like bad figs (horror)

The wooden ox –yoke

Jeremiah wore it around his neck and walked around publicly - it signified subjection of Judah and other nations to Babylonian rule.

Parable of wines and skins and jars

Empty jars represented the people of Judah. wine which would fill them was the instrument of God which would use to punish them for their wickedness.

c. Relevance of Jeremiah teachings to Christian today

- Christian should preach the gospel of Christ
- Christians should denounce evils in modern society e.g corruption, bribery
- Christian should condemn modern forms of idol worship/support monotheism
- Christians should be ready to suffer like Jeremiah /face rejection/opposition
- Christians should ask sinners to repent in order to get eternal life
- Christians should rely on Jeremiah's teaching to deal with dishonesty and distinguish

- true from false prophets.

4. a) How prophet Elijah fought against corruption and injustice in Israel

- Naboth, a peasant farmer had a fruitful vineyard next to King Ahab's palace.
- Ahab coveted Naboth's vineyard and offered to buy it at a better price or have it exchanged for another one
- Naboth refused to sell it or exchange because it was an inheritance from his family
- Ahab's pagan wife Jezebel influenced him to misuse his powers and get the vineyard
- She forged letters in the king's name and sealed them with his rubberstamp, and sent them to the elders
- Naboth was falsely accused of blasphemy and treason which were punishable by stoning to death. His male heirs were also killed
- Ahab then went and possessed the land since it became state property.
- Elijah was sent by God to pronounce judgment to the royal family. He told Ahab that his dynasty would come to an end and that dogs will lick Jezebel's blood in the same place where Naboth was killed
- It was prophet's work to fight injustice in Israel because they were a covenant people and kings were not above the law. (7x1=7mks)

b) How God manifested his power during Prophet Elijah's

- God sent fire to burn the sacrifice during the contest at Mount Carmel with Baal prophets
- God miraculously fed Elijah at the brook of cherith at Beersheba / wilderness
- God brought rain after the drought.
- At mount Horeb, he manifested his presence through a storm, earthquake and lightning
- He brought judgment on King Ahab and his wife-Jezebel.
- Elijah raised the widow's son at Zarephath through God's power. (6x1=6mks)

c) Why Christians should fight against bribery and corruption in Kenya today

- It promotes injustice on the citizens
- It is a criminal offence and anyone involved may be imprisoned
- It leads to suffering of ones family if one is sacked and loses the source of income
- It makes the public lose respect and confidence, especially if it involves leaders
