You may think that expecting food to change your life is too much to ask. But have you considered that eating the right food at the right time will increase your energy, help you manage weight and ward off major illnesses?

Researchers have found that eating a meal with plenty of protein leaves you feeling more satisfied for longer when compared to a meal loaded with low - quality carbohydrates. Your body takes longer to digest protein, leading to a gradual increase in blood sugar. The high protein breakfast will therefore carry you through the morning and, more importantly, through your tea break. Many high - carbohydrate meals are absorbed quickly and send blood sugar on a roller coaster ride, taking your appetite with it and depleting your energy.

Many foods contain antioxidants, but fruits and vegetables may be the richest source. Behaving like chemical warriors, antioxidants neutralize molecules known as free radicals before they damage arteries and body cells. This protects you from heart diseases, high blood pressure, cancer and diabetes; you can now see why antioxidant foods should be consumed in generous portions. Actually, forget pills - antioxidants work best when consumed in foods. In fact, nutritionists recommend that we eat five portions of fruit and vegetables a day. It's less daunting than it sounds: a portion equals a piece of fruit, three tablespoons of cooked vegetables or a glass of flesh juice.

And do you desire to relieve yourself of some baggage? Calcium is the latest weight - loss star to appear on the scene. Scientist stumbled on its magic by accident. From a study that measured the blood pressure of obese people, it was discovered that those who took one large tub of yoghurt a day in their diet lost an average of eleven pounds of body fat in one year, even though they did not eat less.

A follow - up study found that people on a high - calcium diet lost more weight and fat than did people on a low calcium diet -and again, both consumed the same number of Calories.

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Researcher* believe calcium encourages fat cells to stop "getting fatter". Instead, the cells burn extra fat without you having to go anywhere near a gymnasium.

It probably sounds strange to say that you can eat more in order to lose weight. Obviously, the question you should ask immediately is, "Eat more of what?" We are talking about foods rich in fibre. They have what is referred to as low energy density; that translates to few calories relative to weight. This means that you can down a mountain without fear of calorie overload.

Fibre also aids weight loss because it's filling. Most high fibre foods take a lot of chewing, triggering your body's fullness sensors. Moreover, you absorb the food more slowly so you feel full longer. Will the wonders of food ever cease? Not if researchers in nutrition keep up their pace. Let them keep the good news flowing - such as the fact that we don't have to starve ourselves to lose weight and keep disease at bay.

Writing skills are an important part of communication. Good writing skills allow you to communicate your message with clarity and ease to a far larger audience than through face-to-face or telephone conversations.

You might be called upon to write a report, plan or strategy at work; write a grant application or press release within a volunteering role; or you may fancy communicating your ideas online via a blog. And, of course, a well written CV or resume with no spelling or grammatical mistakes is essential if you want a new job.

Today, when anyone can be their own publisher, we see more and more examples of poor writing skills both in print and on the web. Poor writing skills create poor first impressions and many readers will have an immediate negative reaction if they spot a spelling or grammatical mistake. As just one example, a spelling mistake on a commercial web page may cause potential customers to doubt the credibility of the website and the organization.

Correct grammar, punctuation and spelling are key in written communications. The reader will form an opinion of you, the author, based on both the content and presentation, and errors are likely to lead them to form a negative impression.

If you are unconvinced about the importance of accurate writing, think of the clues we use to identify spam emails, “phishing” websites, and counterfeit products: poor grammar and spelling.

Similarly, some employers state publicly that any CV or resume containing spelling or grammatical mistakes will be rejected immediately, whilst a BBC news article quotes research that calculates spelling mistakes cost online businesses “millions” in lost sales.

Checking for poor writing and spelling mistakes should be seen as a courtesy to your readers since it can take them much longer to understand the messages in your writing if they have to think and re-read text to decipher these.

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All written communications should therefore be re-read before sending to print, or hitting the send button in the case of emails, as it is likely that there will be errors. Do not assume that spelling and grammar checkers will identify all mistakes as many incorrect words can indeed be spelt correctly (for example, when “their” is used instead of “there” or “principle” instead of “principal”) or entire words may be missing. If at all possible, take a break before re-reading and checking your writing, as you are more likely to notice problems when you read it fresh.

Even if you know spelling and grammar rules, you should still double-check your work or, even better, have it proof-read by somebody else. Our brains work faster than our fingers can type the accidental typographical errors (typos) inevitably creep in.

The good news is that writing is a skill which can be learned like any other. One trick for checking and improving your work is to read it aloud. Reading text forces you to slow down and you may pick up problems with the flow that your eye would otherwise skip over.

As well as grammar, spelling and punctuation, it’s important to remember your audience.

Always write with your audience in mind, and it can also help to bear in mind the medium in which you plan to publish. This knowledge will help you decide whether you need to write in a formal style or a more informal one, and will also help you to decide on a suitable structure.

Detox kits and supplements are recent health fads. But can they really help you lose weight fast? Online weight loss coach Andrew Cate investigates.

We've heard a lot about the need to detox lately. It is the term used to describe a strict program of elimination and supplementation that is meant to rid your body of impurities, cleaning your liver and kidneys, and flushing your bowel. It is suggested that toxins build up from consuming too much fat, sugar, alcohol, caffeine, preservatives and pollution.

There's no shortage of detox books, kit and programs claiming to help you shed weight, improve your well-being, cause your skin to radiate and make you feel younger. The kits usually contains a dietary program which is supplemented with a variety of vitamins, minerals, tonics, digestive aids and laxatives. They are particularly popular in January as people feel the urge to begin the New Year afresh after overindulging during the festive season.

People will make drastic changes when they go on a detox diet and often feel better for starting a structured regime. However, detox kits made up of herbal laxatives and diuretics are unnecessary and have generally no proven benefit. Detox regimes do not improve kidneys and liver function. These organs are designed to filter your blood fats, alcohol and other nasties- all without the help of a fancy box from your local pharmacy. There is no scientific evidence to support specific detox diets. Programs or supplement kits. However, there's no debate about the fact that eating less junk food, cutting out cigarettes and your alcohol intake etc will benefit your health. For example drinking more water and cutting out caffeine will improve your bowel function. These changes will enhance your well-being but there's nothing magical about the detox diet itself. Rather it's the associated lifestyle changes that benefit your health.

Detox kits that contains laxatives and diuretics to encourage you to fast could, potentially, do more harm than good. Laxatives speed up your bowel motions, but also prevent absorption of nutrients, while diuretics can result to partial dehydration.

The fasting component of a detox should only be minimal, and not extend beyond a day or two. By eating next to nothing, you are not getting enough nutrients for the

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essential functions of your body. Supplements are no substitute for real food, and relying solely on them can result in vitamin deficiencies. Fasting is also known to slow down your metabolic rate, which encourages your body to store fat, making it harder to lose body fat in the future.

If you've spent weeks, months or years overindulging, drinking and smoking you can't hope to fix yourself in a few days. Detox diets aren't an instant cure to health and wellness. Short-term changes to your diet and lifestyle only result in short-term changes to your health and wellness. If you can't stick to the lifestyle changes you make over the long term, there's no point starting them as they won't have any serious impact upon your health.

One good thing about music, Bob Marley sang in Trenchtown Rock, is when it hits you, you feel no pain – but for South Africa’s apartheid regime, the opposite was true as it felt the wrath of musicians who composed protest songs against its oppressive policies.

During the apartheid years, music was more than a solace – it was a “weapon of struggle” used against the aggressor whose only recourse was to ban it from the airwaves, but never from the hearts of the millions who were oppressed.

Music had always been used to soothe souls during sufferance and it is said that it is slavery that gave birth to (heavy metal) rock when slaves used their shackles or tools to make music either to entertain themselves or to irk their captors.

The separatist system that saw people like Nelson Mandela and other black South African leaders jailed for dissidence gave rise to more protest music than ever before.

And South Africa’s anti-apartheid musicians were so influential that their songs were not only banned, but they were also forced into exile. Mandela believes that these protest songs, together with those of non-South Africans, played a significant role in the collapse of apartheid and, indeed, his February 11, 1990 release from Robben Island.

“Artistes reach areas far beyond the reach of politicians. Art, especially entertainment and music, is understood by everybody, and lifts the spirits and the morale of those who hear it,” Mandela admitted after his release.

South Africa’s musicians like Hugh Masekela and the Mirima Makeba started the protest campaign back in the late ‘50s and early ‘60s after leaving South Africa for the United States, where they used music to highlight the desperate situation of their compatriots who were living under oppressive rule in the townships back home.

The Musical campaigns against apartheid intensified internationally throughout the ‘70s and ‘80s and saw the composition, production and performance of many a political song by

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musicians who had never even set foot in African but were inspired to join the anti-apartheid bandwagon- with some, like Paul Simon, even stirring controversy when he was accused of breaking the cultural boycott against South Africa by touring the country and utilizing contributions from local acts.

But the beat never stopped. In the UK, The Specials released Free Nelson Mandela while in the US, Gil Scott-Heron and Brian Jackson released protest classic Johannesburg off the album From South Africa to South Carolina. Little Steven (and the Disciples of Soul), together with Artists United Against Apartheid, conceived and produced Sun City Resort in one of South Africa's so-called homelands where international Musical concerts were frequently held.

We are moving inexorably into the age of automation. Our aim is not to devise a mechanism which can perform a thousand different actions of any individual man, but, on the contrary, one which could, by a single action, replace a thousand men.

Industrial automation has moved along three lines. First, there is conveyor belt system of continuous production whereby separate operations are linked into single sequences. The goods produced by this well-established method are untouched by the worker, and the machine replaces both skilled and semi-skilled.

Secondly, there is automation with feedback control of the product. Here mechanisms are built into the system which can compare the output with a norm, that is, the actual product with what it supposed to be, and then correct any shortcomings. The entire cycle of operations dispenses with human control except in so far as monitors are concerned. One or two examples of this type of automation will illustrate its immune possibilities. There is a factory in the USA which makes 1,000 million electric lights bulbs a year, and the factory employs three hundred people. If the pre-automation were to be employed, the labour force required would leap to 25000. A motor manufacturing company with 45000 spare parts assembles their entire supply entirely by computer. Computers can be entrusted with most of the supervision of industrial installations, such as chemical plants or oil refineries.

Thirdly, there is computer automation, for banks, accounting departments, insurance companies and the like. Here the essentials features are recording, storing and retrieval of information.

The principal merit of modern computing machines is the achievement of their vastly greater speed of operation in comparison with unaided human effort; a task which otherwise might take years, if attempted at all, now takes days or hours.

One of the urgent problems of industrial societies rapidly introducing automation is how to fill the time that will be made free by the machines which will take over the risks of the workers. The question is not simply of filling empty time but also of utilising the surplus human energy that will be released. We are already seeing straws in wind: destructive outbursts on the part of the youth whose work no longer demands muscular strength. While automation will undoubtedly do away with a large number of tedious jobs, are we sure that it will not put others which are equally tedious in their place? An enormous amount of monitoring will be required. A man in an automated plant may have to sit for hours on end watching dials and taking decisive action when some signals inform him that all is not well. What meaning will his occupation bear for the worker? How will he devote his free time after a four or five hour stint of labour?

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Moreover, what, indeed, will be the significance of his leisure to him? If the industry of the future could be purged of its monotony and meaninglessness, man would then be better equipped to use his leisure time constructively.
