- could be - Jesus answered him by narrating the story of a man who was traveling Jerusalem to Jericho who was attacked by robbers and left for the dead.
- inn by the man. - A priest passing by did not help the man, neither did a Levite.
- A Samaritan however had pity on the man. He poured oil and wine on the wounds and carried him on a donkey and took him to an inn where he taken care. The Samaritan paid for the expenses incurred in the inn by the man.
- Jesus then asked the scribe who among the three- the Levite, priest and Samaritan had behaved like a neighbour.
- The scribe said the Samaritan had acted as a neighbour.
- Jesus told the teacher of the law to go and behave like the Samaritan.

b) Give seven reasons why the Pharisees were referred to as hypocrites by Jesus.

- They considered themselves self-righteous-----
- They despised others and looked down upon them.
 - They lacked humility and exalted themselves.
 - They knew the commandments but did not apply them appropriately.
- (They observed them for their own gain).
- They followed Jesus with an intention of finding faults with him/trapping him.
 - They followed rules made by human beings or the traditions of elders as opposed to God's rule.
 - They emphasized the outward cleanliness as opposed to purity of heart.
 - They altered the law of Moses to suit their selfish motives.
 - They were a bad influence to the people and they misled others.
 - Their effect on the people were hidden yet widespread (like yeast in dough).

- i. Through the written word of the bible, God communicates to Christians
 - ii. Scriptures/Bible is God's inspired word, God's power worked through the writers of the bible controlling what was being written .Writers wrote what God's intended them to write
 - iii. The bible contains the God's revelations to human beings
 - iv. Bible contains the salvation history i.e. the purpose of God in creating human beings and redeeming them through Jesus Christ
 - v. The bible is a record of the interventions of God in the life of Israelites community which portray God as loving, merciful and caring
 - vi. The prophetic message in many instances is recorded in first person singular or 'I' utterances as it come from the mouth of the lord
 - vii. Some parts of bible were recorded by God himself e.g. he wrote the covenant law in the book of covenant (table of stone) and handled it over to Moses
- (6 marks)

(b) ***Explain for contributions of human author in writing the bible***

- i. Human Being wrote the bible message that inspired word using the language and figures of speech of their time e.g. old testament was first written in Hebrew language
- ii. Every author/writer was influenced by his historical, social and culture circumstances that prevailed at this time of writing
- iii. God did not dictate to writers what they wrote, Although the message

was inspired authors had their freedom in what they wrote

- iv. The creativity of author or their initiative is detected in the bible e.g Paul in the New Testaments while writing to the Corinthians said "to the rest I say not the lord that if any brother has a wife who is unbeliever and she consent to live with him he should not divorce her (8 marks)

(c) ***Describe the traditional Africa understanding/view of creating***

- i. God is the chief architect in creation
- ii. God creates out of nothing
- iii. God provides the need of human beings
- iv. Man and Woman are created by God to continue human race
- v. Human beings lived in bliss before they disobeyed God
- vi. Happiness and bliss in which humans lived came to an end when humans disobeyed God
- vii. God did not create anything back, all that was created is good
- viii. God sustains all creation

(8 marks)

2. (a) ***Describe the call of Moses***

- i. Moses was taking care of his father's in law (Jethro) flock near Horeb the mountain of God
- ii. The angel of God appeared to Moses in form of flame of fire out to the midst of a bush that was burning but not being consumed and Moses turned to see the great site
- iii. God called Moses out of the bush and Moses headed the call
- iv. God commanded Moses to put off the shoes because the ground on which he was standing was holy and Moses obeyed /God identified himself as God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob and Moses hid his face because he was afraid of looking at God
- v. God told Moses that he has seen the affliction of Israelites, His people in Egypt and he had heart their cry that he knew their suffering and had come

down to deliver them to a good and broad land, flowing with milk and honey

- vi. God also said that he had seen the oppressed and he was sending Moses to Pharaoh so that Moses could bring forth Israelites out of Egypt
- vii. God promises Moses that he would be with him. He also gave Moses a sign that after Moses delivered Israelites, they would serve God in that very mountain
- viii. Moses Sought to know the name of God who was speaking to him and God told him that his name is IAM WHO I AM
- ix. God also told Moses that he was God of Abraham, God of Isaac and God of Jacob and that is name is forever and that is how he is to be remembered throughout all generations
- x. God commanded Moses that once in Egypt , He was to gather elders of the people and together go to the Pharaoh to press the release of Israelites but Pharaoh will not yield to their demand until the mighty hand had intervened
- xi. Moses resisted the call on account of not being eloquent but God provided him with Aaron to become his spokesman
- xii. God would stretch his hand and smite Egypt with wonders or ten plagues to face Pharaoh to release the Hebrews
- xiii. When eventually the Israelites are released, God would make Egyptians favor them so that they left with clothing and jewelry
- xiv. Moses felt inadequate but God empowered him, His shepherded's rod would be used to perform miracles. It turned to a snake and when Moses held it by the tail it became rod again
- xv. Moses was also asked to put his hands in his bosom ,it became leprous but when he put it again it became well like the rest of his flesh
- xvi. If Israelites' still would not believe him ,he would pour some water from the Nile on dry land upon which it would become blood ,with this Israelites would believe him
- xvii. Moses was given the three signs to perform before the Israelites to make them believe that it was God who had actually sent him
- xviii. Moses needed to know the name of God because gods of Egyptians were known by names and Israelites' also knew the name of their God-God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob –their forefathers

(10 marks)

3. (b) Discuss five attributes of God learnt from the ten plagues

- i. God is kind, when he inflicts plague to Egyptians ,he saved the Israelites
- ii. God is merciful , He did not cause death of the firstborn of the Israelites
- iii. God is faithful , he told Moses that by mighty hand he would effect the release

of Israelites and he did it

- iv. God is lord of nature; he caused darkness and hailstorm in Egypt. The waters of the Nile turned into blood. All forces of nature obeyed him
- v. God is mighty and powerful ,although some Egyptians magicians could perform miracle God miracles were very intense/powerful
- vi. God is holy and just. He punishes evil doers such as Egyptians who were oppressing the Israelites (5marks)

(c) Write five instances when Abraham portrayed his faith in God

- i. When God called Abraham first, he asked him to leave his country and his kin go to the land that God would show him, Abraham obeyed and believed in God who had called him
- ii. When God promised to give Abraham great Nation, Abraham believed although he did not have any children
- iii. When God promised Abraham a son who would become heir to his properties, Abraham believed despite that his wife and himself were at very advanced stage of life.
- iv. When God asked Abraham to enter a covenant with Abraham, he agreed
- v. In making of Abraham covenant ,only God was bound as he was the only one who passed between halves of animals, Abraham could only respond to God in faith and obedience and trust that all the promises would be fulfilled
- vi. When God asked Abraham to sacrifice his only son ,Abraham didn't hold him back to himself
- vii. When in Canaan God appeared to Abraham at the sacred tree of morch Abraham built an altar for the God who had appeared to him
- viii. Abraham agreed to undertake circumcision as a sign of covenant people although he himself was old. He circumcised all his slaves as well (5 marks)

4. (a) Explain eight effects of idolatry in Israel

- i. Syncretism was developed; Israel mixed beliefs in Yahweh with practice from Canaanite religion .They took part in Canaanite fertility rite but when in military crises they would turn to Yahweh

- ii. Former places for the worship of pagan gods were turned into places for the worship of Yahweh without removing Canaanite symbols such as their altars and pillar some of such sanctuaries were Mizpah, Shechem and Gilgal
 - iii. Israelites adopted the Canaanite agricultural calendar for the timing of pilgrimage festival
 - iv. Israelites began to use names of the Canaanite gods for Yahweh e.g. EL , the name of all father of gods was applied to Yahweh
 - v. Israel parents began to name their children after Baal e.g. Gideon one of the judges was also known as Jembaal meaning 'lt Baal contend'
 - vi. Sacrificial system of the Canaanites was incorporated into Israelites worship of Yahweh e.g. peace offering, burnt offering (holocaust) and cereal offering(oblation)were formally Canaanite in religion.
-
- vii. Ahab declared Baalism an official state religion, Baal was worshiped as the lord of heavens who sustained and gave life .Ahab did this as an influence from his idolaters wife Queen Jezebel
 - viii. Jezebel ordered destruction of altars of Yahweh
 - ix. Prophet of Yahweh were killed and the remaining few went into hiding
 - x. The 450 prophet of Baal were made in order to promote and protect the Baal region
 - xi. Erection of places of worship for the Canaanites god, some king such as Jeroboam and Solomon erected places for worship for the gods his wives while Jeroboam made idols at Bethel and Dan so that Israel could stop attending the temple at Jerusalem

(9 marks)

5. (b) ***State why Samuel implored/burred /resisted against having a king in Israel***

- i. King would enslave Israelites
- ii. King would make people turn away from worship of Yahweh
- iii. Will exploit people
- iv. Will tax them heavily
- v. Would take their land to give it to his official
- vi. Would take daughter to work at his palace
- vii. Conscript young men into labor

- viii. Will sell a part of Israel
- ix. To ask for kings was rejection of God who was their invisible king
- x. Israel was meant to be unique nation dedicated in service of God. They were not like any other nation .Having a king would make them to lose their uniqueness of a theocratic community
- xi. Israel would cease to be God's people.

(c) Discuss the importance of David as an ancestor for Christ

- i. David ,when he desired to build a temple for God, was promised a number of things by God whose full implementation are felt in the new testament
- ii. David and his descendants would be kept safe from all enemies, Christians are the new Israel ,God protect them with Jesus conquering evil and death. Christians are safe heirs of the kingdom of God
- iii. God would give descendant of David a place to settle. Israelites were given Canaan. Christian have been given Messianic land of God where Christ has gone to prepare a way for them
- iv. God promised that David 'son would be the one to build a temple for him. God's relationship with the king would be like that of a father to his sons,
- v. Jesus built the temple of God in the heart of men, He said he would demolish a temple at Jerusalem in a day and rebuild it within three days referring to his death and resurrection
- vi. God promised to establish an everlasting kingdom for David .he is an eternal shall never end
- vii. God promised to make the name of David great among leaders of the earth: Jesus is most high King descended from the house of David and David is remembered as great for being ancestor of Christ

4. (a) Explain four teaching of Amos concerned Israel's elections

- i. Elections placed a responsibility on Israel share by no other Nation. This responsibility would bring a more severe punishment on Israel(Amos 3:2)
- ii. Israel was not chosen because she merited. God could have chosen any other nation for his self revelation Amos 9:7Are you not like Ethiopians to me
- iii. God is active in history of other Nation even though they are not aware that he leads and judges them e.g. Syria and Philistia were enemies. Israel's

enemy yet God had brought them to occupy their homelands just as God had brought Israelites from Egypt to Canaan

- iv. Israel should have understood the doctrine of election to mean that they were called to serve Yahweh rather than to manipulate him to serve Israel. Yahweh is the God of all nations

(8 marks)

(b) In which six ways can the teaching of Amos on Israel election apply to Christian Today?

- i. Christians are people of God the new Israel; they have been chosen to serve God as a royal priesthood. They are a holy Nation
- ii. God chose Christians so that they can proclaim his wonderful acts i.e. the choice has responsibility attached to it
- iii. Christians should not presume on God's election as a guarantee of getting into the kingdom of God like Israelites during the time of Amos did
- iv. Christian election/choice goes with a moral responsibility. They have been called from darkness to marvelous light
- v. Christians have entered into a special covenant relationship with God through his son Jesus Christ
- vi. Christians are follower of Jesus and they should implement Jesus' commands through teaching healing and doing other works

(6marks)

(c) Write six methods that the prophets used to convey message to the people of their time

- i. Songs - Sometimes God's message was put across as a song e.g. Isaiah sang the song of vineyard and gardener
- ii. Preaching- Some message was given in form of a sermon e.g. Jeremiah delivered a sermon in the temple because people thought it was indestructible yet it had lost relevance as it was misused
- iii. Symbolic act: This was an acted form of the message from God e.g. Jeremiah bought a field when Judah was faced with imminent destruction to signify hope and restoration
- iv. Letters – Some prophet wrote letters e.g. Jeremiah wrote to the exiles in Babylon to surrender to Nebuchadnezzar as God was using him to punish Israel because of her sins
- v. Imagery- Prophets used metaphors which were short, vivid and striking enough to be remembered e.g. Amos Said "each a lion roar in its den unless it has caught something"

- vi. First person singular or I “utterance” sometimes the message of the lord was given in its original form as it came from the mouth of the lord. Always the prophet would conclude by saying “thus says the lord”
- vii. Personal life of the prophet became a mode of communication e.g. Jeremiah did not marry to signify broken relationship between Israel and God

(6 marks)

5 (a) Describe the procedure that was followed in the dedication of the wall of Jerusalem

- i. The community formed a grand procession which moved in opposite direction ,the musicians followed by the civil officials half of the community leaders, priest and their trumpets and Levites with their musical instrument moved towards the right
- ii. The other group in procession towards left .Nehemiah was in this group
- iii. The two group converged in the temple where the ceremony of singing and elaborate sacrificial rituals and festive noise continued, the whole world community restored their wholeness as they dedicated the wall of Jerusalem
- iv. The community gave provisions for the priest and Levites and the gods were stored in the temple .These wages of temple officials in accordance with the law

(4 marks)

(b) Explain and analyses Nehemiah final reforms

- i. Nehemiah enforced the policy of exclusivist where Jesus were separated from their neighbors. Separation from foreigners .All citizens were enrolled according to their genealogies to be able to trace their ancestry ,it has important to be born in the right family
- ii. Reading Mosaic Law: It was read to publicly in this occasion Nehemiah denounced relationship with Ammonites because they had resisted Israelites entries into their land on their way to Canaan
- iii. Expulsion: Nehemiah expelled Tobiah from the temple, reorganized some store rooms and reformed tithing system. Tobiah and Sanballat were foreigners who were related to Jewish priest by marriage alliance and they had been allowed to carry on trade in temple.
- iv. Eliaship the priest who had married Sanballat daughter was banned from priestly duties
- v. Nehemiah restored Levites and singers into their rightful place
- vi. Nehemiah formed a panel of four to supervise the distribution of tither of priest, Levites, musicians and governor. This was to ensure equitable

distribution of resources

- vii. Restoration of Sabbath: Those that worked and traded on Sabbath were warned that God's wrath would befall them if they did not stop the abuse, levites were commanded to protect purity of Sabbath. The temple gates were guarded to keep Sabbath holy
- viii. Nehemiah stationed his personal guards in temple to prevent traders to enter it from Friday to Saturday
- ix. A strong wall was built around the Jewish wall of exclusiveness based on birth and religious loyalty
- x. Nehemiah noted that children from mixed marriage could not speak Hebrew language, he humiliated the culprits by pulling their hair (10 marks)

(c) *State the teachings from Nehemiah exemplary life to the life as depicted in Luke's gospel*

- i. Prayerfulness: Nehemiah maintained a prayerful spirit i.e. before he made request whenever he faced difficulties e.t.c Jesus too prayed on several occasions i.e. during the transfiguration on the mount of olives and he taught and urged follower to pray
- ii. Compassionate: Nehemiah did not want to witness suffering for his people, He even contributed to his own resources and gave to strangers. In his ministry, Jesus was compassionate to those that he healed and gave food and all the marginalized
- iii. Reformer: Nehemiah instituted social, economic and religious reforms. He ensured that the poor were not exploited more than the rich through debts, slavery or excessive interest rate. In like's gospel, Jesus was also a reformer who instituted a new covenant by his blood although his covenant is based on faith
- iv. Reforms in the temple: Nehemiah objected the temple defilement and expelled Tobiah, Sanballat and Elias dib who were using it as a market place. he also reformed the tithing system, Jesus too expelled money exchangers from the temple and instituted that the temple is God's house and a house of prayer
- v. Opposition: As governor of Judah, Nehemiah faced several hardships as he was constantly exposed by leaders of nations around him. He faced sabotage from Shemiah the prophet and prophetess, Noadiah but he did not get discouraged. He was accused of plotting against Persian emperor. Jesus too experienced opposition from scribes Pharisees, Sadducees, high priest and Jewish political leaders. He was accused of sedition or treason planning to overthrow the roman emperor

- The swine rushed and drowned in a nearby lake.
- The herdsmen then fled and went to tell people in the city concerning what had happened.
- People came and found the man sitting at the feet of Jesus, healed, dressed and in his right mind.
- The people of Gerase reacted negatively to the good act of healing
- They were afraid of Jesus and asked him to depart from them.
- The healed man asked Jesus whether he could accompany Him.

- i. He married women from many foreign countries like Egypt, Edom and Sidom and Moab. In so doing, he broke the Torah, which clearly state that Israelites were not to marry foreigners, who would bring idol worship to Israel.
- ii. He allowed his wives to worship their gods (idols) and he built temples and altars for them, therefore failing to follow his father's instructions.
- iii. Solomon himself started worshiping Idols like Ashtarte, the goddess of Sidon.
- iv. Solomon loved himself more than God in that he built his palace for 13 years, but took only 7 years to construct God's temple.
- v. He used foreign materials, designs and designers in the construction of the temple thus failings to walk in the ways of the lord.
- vi. Soon after becoming a king, Solomon killed his half –brother Adonijah on suspicion that he could be a rival to the throne; thus breaking the commandment that says, "You shall not kill."
- vii. King Solomon lived lavishly, with an expensive lifestyle thus consuming most of

the nation's resources.

- viii. He burdened the citizens with high taxes to meet his expensive lifestyle.
- ix. He oppressed the people with forced labour, equal to enslaving them, thus against the covenant laws.
- x. He made treaties with other nations e.g. Sidon and Egypt, therefore disobeying one of the conditions set by God for the renewal of the covenant (Ex. 34:15)
- xi. He was extravagant and careless, in that he took / treated national property as his own personal property. He sold a piece of Israel's land to Hiram, the king of Tyre, to settle a debt, against God's law, where Israelite land belonged to God.

- The Pharisees despised the tax collector
- He said that he fast twice a week , gives tithes

maintained peace by developing diplomatic relations.

- It was the dwelling place of God
- The Ark of the Covenant was kept in the temple.
- It was the centre of major annual religious festivals such as the Passover.
- Religious rites were performed in the temple e.g. purification, dedication & reconciliation

- The Jews believed the messiah would appear from the temple.

- The temple united the Jews as the people of God.

- They acted as mediators between God and people

- They acted as the conscience of the kings advising and rebuking them as the

 - He proclaimed Gods judgment on sinners
 - He taught on the universality of God as controlling all nations of the earth
 - He performed miracles of healing the sick, raising of the dead and exercising demons
 - He showed compassion on suffering
 - He faced the political & religious leaders courage
 - He had disciples
 - He reminded people of the commandments of God.
 - He led exemplary life to be emulated by those he taught.
 - He foretold the future e.g. destruction of Jerusalem denial of Peter, Passion, Death and resurrection.

5. a) How the people of Judah renewed their covenant with God under the Leadership of

Ezra.

- The entire Jewish community gathered in the public square in Jerusalem
- Ezra was asked to read the law to the people
- The people performed the ritual gestures of raising and lowering they heads and bodies as a sign of repentance.
- They re-enacted the feast of both shelters and dwelt in Makeshift huts.
- They had a national day of confession in which they fasted and put on sack cloths as a sign of repentance.
- They separated themselves from foreigners
- Ezra led the people in prayer of confession in which he recounted God's love and faithfulness to his promises.
- The covenant was sealed through signing of the agreement by the leaders who included Nehemiah, the princes, priests and Levites.
- The people promised to live in accordance with the Mosaic Law and carry out its demands.
- Community leaders were settled in Jerusalem to safeguard it against external attackers.
- Nehemiah kept a record of leaders who took residence in Jerusalem.

b) Why Nehemiah carried out religious reforms in Judah

- To preserve the identity of the Jews as people of God.
- To separate the Jews from foreign influence

- To purify the temple that had been defiled by keeping a foreigner.
- To reinstate the services of the Levites as priests of the temple.
- To restore the tithing system that had been forgotten for the upkeep of the temple
- To ensure that the Sabbath day was free from business activities.

c) Lessons Christians learn from the renewal of the covenant by Nehemiah (6mks)

- Christians should ask for their sins to be forgiven.
 - They should lead righteous lives
 - They should always pray to God
 - They should demonstrate humility
-
- They should avoid groups that can negatively influence their faith in God.
 - They should teach others the word of God.
 - They should set aside a day of worship
 - They should respect the church as a place of prayer.

6. a) Express the traditional African belief in life after death.

- Initiation was ordained by the ancestors and therefore practicing the rite is showing obedience to the ancestors
 - Rejection of the rite of initiation may lead to punishment from the ancestors
 - In some communities a person cannot be buried before circumcision if he is a grown up for fear of him being rejected in the spirit world.
 - The shedding of blood during initiation binds the living and the dead.
 - It is only after initiation that a person is allowed to procreate so that after death there will be off springs to inherit him / remember him.
 - Initiation songs depict past heroes and ancestors who withstood the operation without fear.
 - The herbs used in the wound are said to belong to the ancestors who
 - Polishing of libation is to please the ancestors and welcome them to participate in the initiation ceremonies
 - Prayers are made through the ancestors for protection and for reception of blessings on the initiates.
 - Sacrifices and offerings are made to the ancestors on behalf of the initiates.
 - All members of the community participate in the initiation ceremony (the living, the dead and the unborn).
 - The initiate are told stories of the ancestors so that they can emulate them.
 - Initiation is a stage closer to death which leads to life after death where they will meet the ancestors.
 - Ancestors are consulted before initiation takes place
-
- In some communities initiates acquire names of ancestors after initiation to honor them.
 - The end of seclusion symbolizes death into childhood and rise to new life into adulthood.

b) Ways in which ceremonies conducted during death stress the importance of

solidarity in traditional African communities. (7mks)

- Death disrupts communal life. It is viewed as an enemy and so people come together to face a common enemy.
- Death is a destructive element which causes loss of life and sorrow so people come together to express their grief and give each other moral support in a difficult time.
- Relatives and friends come together to console each other.
- The people help in sharing duties and meeting funeral expenses such as feeding of mourners who have come from far.
- Prayers and sacrifices are made so as to protect the community and people and ask the ancestors to accept the dead in the world of spirits.

- Specialists are consulted so as to weld off dangers and imminence death to the community.
- Members of the bereaved family go through a shaving ceremony
- Death brings the memory of the ancestors to the living thus bringing the living, the dead and the living together.
- Relatives gather together to attend the burial ceremony to bid farewell to the separated.
- Death brings reconciliation to the community.
- The treatment of the body before burial such as washing, anointing and dressing shows that the living are ready to continue caring for the departed.
- In some communities married relatives of the dead person are required to come together to recreate the dead person
- Funeral ceremonies are a communal affair
- Wife inheritance is carried out by some communities to raise children for departed husband.

c) Ways Christians are preparing themselves for life after death (5mks)

- Being baptized
- Condemning social evils
- Preaching the gospel
- Leading exemplary lives
- Inviting people to repentance
- Praying /going to church
- Writing Christian literature
- Reading the Bible

- He condemned evil doers irrespective of their status

- She fell at Jesus feet and wept. She wet Jesus feet with her tears, wiped them with her hair, kissed them and poured the expensive oil on them.

- When Simon and his fellow Pharisees saw this they wondered if Jesus was truly the Messiah, he would know that the woman was a sinner.

- Jesus answered Simon by giving him a parable of two debtors who owed money to a certain money lender. The lender cancelled the debts for the debtors could not pay.

- Jesus explained to Simon, the Pharisees, that a person who acknowledges that he or she has sinned and asks for forgiveness often appreciates forgiveness the most.
